Research Once; Write Twice

This workshop for students in the MFA Writing program emphasizes the importance of reusing your research material in multiple works, for professional writers and academics. (Summer Residency 2013)

MFA January 2013 Winter Residency Workshop

Pitching Yourself: Personal Career Documents

This workshop for students in the MFA Writing program emphasizes the crafting of personal career documents, focusing on the resume, the curriculum vitæ and the clip file, for professional writers and academics. (Winter Residency 2013)

WRT 498W: Sports Writing/Sports Reporting (3 credits)

This upper-division course focuses on game day writing, previews, recaps, profiles and long-form features. It focuses on newspaper and magazine writing and publication. Developed and taught.

WRT 490W: Internship/Practicum in Writing (3 credits)

This is for running an undergraduate internship. Students are encouraged to create a syllabus with the professor to incorporate study into their writing work experience.

WRT 465W: Thesis (3 credits)

This capstone course focuses on workshops and exercises designed to help graduating majors complete their senior theses and writing portfolios.

WRT 338W: Writing About Specialized Subjects (3 credits)

This upper-division course encourages students to explore and develop a niche for their feature writing. Students write multiple features in a single subject — such as food, sports or fashion — and learn to market and publish their work.

WRT 245W: Technical Writing (3 credits)

This course is recommended for many science majors and for Writing majors interested in this aspect of professional writing. Students learn the fundamentals of usability, multimodal communication, instruction sets, technical reports and other technical forms.

WRT 210W: Managerial Writing (3 credits)

This course is required for many types of business majors, and it is primarily populated by those students. Students learn the fundamentals of workplace communication, emphasizing audience, purpose and tone.

WRT 201: Academic Resources & Citation (1 credit)

This course, taught entirely online through Blackboard Learn, introduces students to academic research in the disciplines. It emphasizes electronic resources available through the library and proper citation in the style appropriate to the student's major. Developed and taught.

This writing workshop examines competition, imitation, influence, and appropriation among writers in a single genre, specifically how contemporary writers have responded to one another and their contemporaries. Students are encouraged to imitate and appropriate the texts in the course. This section focuses on the "scientific romance" heritage of H.G. Wells and Jules Verne and how it influenced the modern steampunk sub-genre of science fiction.

WRT 102W: Introduction to the Creative Process (3 credits)

This course serves as an introduction to the creative process that goes into any kind of writing, with the emphasis in this semester on magazine writing and publication, as well as technical writing, personal career documents and instruction sets. Writing projects in different genres will help students develop their own working methods and match these methods a writing task.

WRT 101: Composition I (3 credits)

This course will instill in students the habit of writing. They will use writing to master challenging subject matter and discover their own legitimate and powerful relationship to that material. Students will learn how to convey their own ideas persuasively. Students will also learn the fundamentals of writing a fully documented research essay.
