<u>J</u>USTICE, <u>A</u>LLYSHIP, <u>D</u>IVERSITY & <u>E</u>QUITY CERTIFICATE

PURPOSE

Society is rapidly becoming more diverse across all domains of life, including where we work, live, and learn. Yet, many people lack equal access and opportunity, and face exclusionary practices in a variety of settings due to their religion, age, gender-identification, sexual orientation, race, ethnicity, immigration and disability status, among other factors. The JADE certificate provides students with sociological understandings of the production and reproduction of inequalities in society and equips certificate holders with both substantive knowledge and practical strategies and skills needed to foster social justice and human equity in a range of organizational settings within the business, human resources, legal, nonprofit, educational, and public administration sectors.

The goals of the Justice, Allyship, Diversity, and Equity (JADE) undergraduate certificate are three-fold:

- to facilitate students' *understanding of and critical thinking about social inequalities* and how various people have been systematically marginalized due to race, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, disability status, socioeconomic status, immigration status, religion, and age among other characteristics
- to train students to use data to analyze and understand social inequalities
- to equip students with *practical strategies and analytic skills for promoting and implementing policies and actions* that foster social justice and human equity in educational, community, business, legal and other organizational settings.

REQUIREMENTS

The JADE certificate requires 12-14 credits of coursework^{*} in three areas:

- 1. Foundational Course: SOCY 2001 Inequalities in the Social World (required)
- 2. Substantive Courses: 2 courses (6 credits) from List A below
- 3. Skills Course: 1 course (3-5 credits) from List B below

^{*}All courses applied to the certificate must be taken at CU Denver, with a minimum grade of C- in each, and an overall GPA of 2.0 in the set of courses taken for the certificate. 6 credits must be at the 3000 or 4000-level.
