*WHEREAS, National History Day in Colorado is a successful partnership between K-12 and higher education, strengthening the skills that students need to succeed in school and the workforce; and*

*WHEREAS, students develop a thesis statement, conduct primary and secondary source research, analyze their work, and present their research creatively in one of five formats: papers, websites, documentaries, performances, and exhibits; and*

*WHEREAS, the National History Day in Colorado program aligns with the Colorado Academic Standards and accomplishes important benchmarks such as critical thinking, problem solving, global and cultural awareness, information literacy, collaboration and communication, self-direction, personal responsibility, civic responsibility, work ethic, invention skills, and creativity and innovation.*

**Preliminary Rounds Judging and Interviews** are from about 9:00am-1:00pm. Verify your interview time and location in this program. Performances and documentaries are open for public viewing during the contest.

**What happens after Preliminary Round interviews?**

- o Final round qualifiers will be posted between 12:30–1:30pm on the first floor of the Student Commons Building. Final rounds judging will go from 12:30 to approximately 3:30. There will be final rounds in all categories EXCEPT SIPerf, SGPerf, SID, JGPerf, and SGW.
- o Final round qualifiers for documentaries, papers, websites & exhibits do not need to be present. Performances must be present in the final rounds, and perform again for JIPerf.
- o Exhibit public viewing is from 12:00-1:00 in the Lola and Rob Salazar Student Wellness Center or whenever judging has finished.
- o Final round qualifying and special award-nominated Exhibits must remain in the Lola and Rob Salazar Student Wellness Center until 4:00 pm. All other exhibits may be removed between 1:00- 1:30. Remaining exhibits must be removed between 4:00-4:30.

**What's New?**

We have two new events at the NHDC State Contest. A *“Bored” Game Room* will be in Student Commons Room 1600. And a *Guest Lecture Series* will run from 1 pm-4 pm in Student Commons Room 2600 with a tour immediately following the final lecture. Two fabulous food trucks will be on site next to the Lynx statue!

**The Awards Ceremony takes place at 5:00 pm in the Lola and Rob Salazar Student Wellness Center.** National qualifying and special awards winners will be announced. If you are self-nominated for a Special Award, your attendance is expected. Come cheer for your friends and show some school pride! Final results will also be posted on the homepage of National History Day in Colorado after the awards ceremony.

## Frequently Asked Questions

### **What can students and parents do during downtime?**

- Go meet new people in the Bored Game Room, attend the Guest Lecture Series, and visit a local museum. Participate in a tour of the campus.

Food trucks will be on site for lunch outside of the Student Commons Building from 10am-4pm!!

### **What times do I/does my student need to be at their judging area?**

- Students should be at their judging area at least 15 minutes before their scheduled time.

### **How will the interview work?**

- Be prepared to present and/or discuss your project. Students in the Paper, Website and Exhibit category should wait to be called by a volunteer or judge by the door. Documentary and Performance students may be in the room during all judging times if they so wish. The judges are responsible for calling an entry to present. Parents may not participate in any questions and may not interrupt any judge or speak for their student.

### **I'm in Performances. is there a place for me to store my props/costumes/sets?**

- Performance students may use the hallways to organize their performance pieces, but they cannot block walking areas and should be kept towards the walls. Please know that the rooms are not secured and NHDC is not responsible for lost or stolen items. Parents are not permitted to carry any props into or out of a judging room. It is solely the student's responsibility.

### **How can I find my student/spouse/teacher?**

- Go to the Registration in Student Commons to see if your student has checked in.
- See the schedule for students' interview times and location and go to their judging room.

### **Can the public view the competition?**

- Exhibits will be open for public viewing in the Lola and Rob Salazar Student Wellness Center from 12:00-1:00 p.m. The interviews are closed and only the student may attend.
- Performances and Documentaries are open to the public in the preliminary rounds.
- Papers and websites are closed to public viewing and only the student may attend the interview.

### **How do we know if we need to be present for the final round?**

- Finalists will be posted from 12:30 to 1:15 on the first floor of the Student Commons outside room 1600.
- NO students need to be present for final rounds. However, if your project makes it to the final rounds, you are expected to be at the Awards Ceremony.
- There are no interviews during the final rounds.

### **When will the winners for each category be announced?**

- Final results will be announced at the Awards Ceremony in the Lola and Rob Salazar Student Wellness Center at 5:00. There are a lot of awards, once you are seated, you may not leave until the awards are over. All participants and their families will respect the award process by not interrupting the ceremony by leaving the bleacher section.

### **How do I get my judging forms?**

- Judges forms will be released electronically at 8am on Monday, April 28th. Teachers and students will log in to ZFairs and download the evaluations as a PDF document.

### **National Competition**

- First and second place in each category qualify for nationals. Third place serves as an alternative. Families have until April 30th to decide if they will attend the National Contest.
- National qualifiers must stay for a brief meeting following the Awards Ceremony.



Since 1973, The Emmanuel Art Gallery, located on the Auraria Campus in downtown Denver, exhibits the work of exceptional artists from around the world and Colorado. The Emmanuel is a non-profit art gallery committed to enhancing the understanding and experience of the visual arts. Through the presentation of significant art exhibitions, lectures, and events, our purpose is to encourage critical thinking, creativity, and meaningful exchange between artists and audiences. Programs at the Emmanuel Art Gallery promote education, empathy, and creativity to the diverse cultural community of the Auraria campus and the Denver metropolitan area.

## **HISTORY**

Built in 1876, the Emmanuel Art Gallery is Denver's oldest standing religious structure. In 1969, the Emmanuel Chapel was approved for listing on the National Register of Historic Places and was also the first building listed as a historic site by Denver's Landmark Preservation Commission. In 1973, Emmanuel became part of the Auraria Campus—which includes the University of Colorado Denver, Metropolitan State University of Denver, and Community College of Denver. It has since been remodeled for use as an art gallery and is managed by the University of Colorado Denver.

In 1874 Bishop John F. Spaulding purchased the land that had been the site of an older religious building, a non-denominational Sunday school built by Col. Lewis N. Tappan in 1859. In 1876, Bishop Spaulding built an Episcopalian Chapel, now the Emmanuel Art Gallery.

As the neighborhood grew, in 1903 Emmanuel Episcopal Chapel was purchased by the congregation of Shearith Israel and converted to a synagogue. Throughout the early years, Emmanuel Shearith Israel Chapel served the developing Jewish community and became affectionately known as the Tenth Street Shul. For over half of a century, the synagogue served the Jewish community. As members of the congregation moved to other neighborhoods, in 1958 services ended and the Shearith Israel Synagogue was sold.

From 1958 to 1973, the owner Wolfgang Pogzeba used the chapel as an artist's studio. Mr. Pogzeba updated the electrical and plumbing systems and, except for replacing the original wooden doors with bronze doors, respected the historical integrity of the structure. Though the facility was upgraded in 2006, very little of the original architecture has changed.

The building is constructed of stone with 12' x 18" wall buttresses. The architectural style is a combination of Romanesque and Gothic influences. Windows in front and along the sides have pointed Gothic arches. Originally, rose windows existed in the front and back walls. The building measures 24' x 66'. When it was converted from an Episcopalian Chapel to a Synagogue, the interior was changed very little, though a balcony was added and the ceiling was re-plastered and rounded.

It is important to recognize and honor that we are on the traditional territories and ancestral homelands of the Cheyenne, Arapaho, and Ute nations in what is now called Denver, Colorado. The confluence of the Platte and Cherry Creek Rivers, where the Auraria campus is now located, was the epicenter for numerous activities for over forty-five Indigenous Nations, including the Lakota, Kiowa, Comanche, Apache, Shoshone, Paiute, Zuni, and Hopi, among others. The painful history of genocide and forced removal of Indigenous peoples from this territory demands that we pay respect and give reparations. Indigenous peoples are the original stewards of this land; they still have ties here, and they should be able to thrive here. Wherever we are, however we gather, it is our responsibility to recognize and address our roles in ongoing forms of colonization.

It is also important to acknowledge that the Auraria campus' establishment – and its continued existence today – was only made possible through the forced removal of the Auraria neighborhood's predominantly Latinx residents and the demolition of the community that those residents created and fought to save. While the Displaced Aurarian Scholarship is one step toward reparations, this history demands that we pay respect and work toward recompense.
